Pan-Africanize or Wither Away!

€ €2015-2024" was proclaimed in December 2013 the "International Decade for People of African Descent" by the UN General Assembly (resolution 68/237). The goal of this proclamation is to foster "recognition, justice and development" of People of African descent. Now that we are moving close to the end of this decade, it is fitting to reflect on the fundamental philosophy of Pan-African consciousness that is so essential to the liberation and development of the African people in Africa and the Diaspora.

In the first half of the 20th century, some African intellectuals from the Americas, Europe and Africa developed the philosophy of Pan-Africanism in response to the danger of slave trade and colonial oppression. We can grasp the meaning and scope of Pan-Africanism in various texts published since the time of abolitionists Ottobah Cugoano (1757-1791) and Olaudah Equiano (1745-1797), and most notably in the documents of the first 5 major Pan-African Congresses held in the wake of the first world war, between 1919 and 1945, under the leadership of William Edward Burghardt Du Bois (1868–1963) and Georges Padmore (1903-1959), and in the 6th Pan-African Congress held in Tanzania in 1974. In light of these congresses, we can summarize the key points of the Pan-African movement as follows:

- 1) Affirmation of African agency through the motto "Africa for the Africans"
- 2) Unity of the African continent in one country: The United States of Africa

- Moral, spiritual and cultural renaissance of Africa
- 4) Moving Africa from the spirit of tribalism to African nationalism
- 5) Faith in Democracy
- 6) Affirmation of Non-violence and rejection of violence
- 7) Planetary solidarity
- Economic development of Africa 8)
- Neutrality regarding the political ideology of the Western Capitalist bloc and the Communist regime of Moscow.

These points summarize in broad strokes the answer to the fundamental question, "What is Pan-Africanism?" They reverberate in an updated way in the "Seven Aspirations" of the Agenda 2063 articulated by the African Union. This is so precisely because several decades after the early Pan-African congresses the struggle remains mutatis mutandis the same, against an almost similar danger.

Since its inception, the twenty-first century has emerged as a bewildering whirlpool of polarizing geopolitical and social forces which indicate that the world is at a problematic, if not, dangerous crossroad. The 2001 tragedy of "9-11" and its ensuing global war on terror, the 2007-2008 Global Financial Crisis, Covid-19, the Russian-Ukrainian war, and the recent "Gaza vs Israel Nakba" illustrate well the pathology of a world which has moved from the Kabuki theater of corrupt politics to the tears and fear of a real Greek tragedy. With the progressive dwindling of the problematic "world order" established in the wake of the second world war the world is now in search of a new equilibrium, while the increasing competition between global powers vying for the dominion of the world is increasing chaos and mayhem. In this arena of the battle between the hegemonic forces of uni-polarity and neo-colonialism and the advocates of multi-polarity and strategic autonomy the survival of microscopic polities and powerless nations is in serious jeopardy. Fragmented by the colonial legacy into 55 incoherent and unstable nations, Africa discovers the drama of realpolitik in a world dominated by political, geographical, demographic, economic or military giants such as China, India, Russia, EU and the US with its frightening NATO. Swimming in this ocean of sharks, Africans discover that they have become

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capitalists without capital and nationalists without nation. Generally speaking, Africans consume what they do not produce and produce what they do not consume - be it in the area of agriculture or in the area of minerals. Despite its widely sought out natural resources, the reality of Africa in this first half of the twenty-first century is that its position in the global economy is peripheral. With few exceptions, African countries are marginal to global economic transactions, and their impact on the decisions that shape the global economy is negligeable. It becomes self-evident that unity is a sine qua non for survival, as a powerful Latin American slogan - popularized in protest song by the Chilean Sergio Ortega Alvarado - has it: El pueblo unido jamás será vencido! In other words, for Africa, as our political and intellectual forebears understood it in light of the tragedies of past centuries, Pan-Africanism is the key to the kingdom of survival: Pan-Africanize or die in painful agony!

Africa has several countries with less than ten million people, some even have less than one million people. Several others are so geographically minuscule that they cannot properly satisfy the economic and security needs of their population. Even large countries with sufficient human and natural resources are interdependent. This is well understood by a great many nations as we see in the development of Pan-Arabism, Pan-Slavism, Pan-Americanism, the creation of the European Union, etc.

Home to vast natural resources defined by the European Union, the US and some other powers from the East and

the West as "critical" and "strategic" minerals for their prosperity and security, Africa finds itself in a precarious situation as the battleground of rapacious foreign interests. This is to say that the struggle for genuine independence and human flourishing is not over, for the same danger that led our forefathers and foremothers to articulate the philosophy of Pan-Africanism, to create the OAU and to struggle against the colonization of the mind is still alive. Perhaps even more menacing than ever. As historians have it, "Barbarians are at the gate," and even already inside the gate and inside our head! Barbarians that attack African values, Barbarians that sow divisions and destroy African solidarity and hospitality, Barbarians that kill African prosperity and hope in the future, enemies of African States, enemies of the human race, enemies of Humanity as a whole.... Barbarians here, Barbarians there, Barbarians everywhere....The history of Africa is a long trail of struggle to escape the violence of dangerous Barbarians. This is why our Pan-African Dialogue Institute pays special attention to our ancestral values of human dignity, now widely known as "Ubuntu," values as old as humanity itself in a continent which is the cradle of humankind and civilization. The call to Pan-Africanism is therefore a call to leave behind the ways of Barbarians and become fully humane, by transcending divisions of gender, race, ethnicity, religion, political opinions and jingoism. Without Pan-African unity and solidarity, Africa will remain powerless and subsequently wealthless and worthless. In this globalized world, the challenges of our time impose upon us a choice: pan-Africanize or wither away!

ISRAEL-HAMAS WAR: PAN-AFRICANISTS CALL FOR A CEASEFIRE



N the 17th day of November, 2023, the Commission on African Politics, Governance and International Affairs and the Commission on Law and Human Rights jointly held a Continental Dialogue Session via Zoom on the theme: AFRICA AND THE ISRAEL-HAMAS WAR: THE PAN-AFRICAN PERSPECTIVE. The webinar was attended by eminent personalities of The Pan-Africa Dialogue Institute (TPADI) across the world. The event focused on the bloody conflict between Israel and Hamas which has led to the loss of many lives and properties in Israel and Palestine. It was indeed an important dialogue session using TPADI approach to explore the implications of the conflict for the African people.

of the Institute, Dr. Jean-Loius Ikambana, stated that the webinar was meant to bring African professionals and thinkers together to analyze the ongoing war from the Pan-African point of view. He added that as a think tank we pride ourselves in participating in policy formulation based on critical analysis that is guided by our Pan-African approach. The ultimate goal of the task, according to Dr. Ikambana, was the well-being of the African people. The webinar was to help in gathering facts and analyzing them in order to propose policy recommendations to stakeholders towards peace in the region.

The International President of the Institute, Dr. Effiong Udo, while delivering his opening remarks thanked all the participants from Africa and in the diaspora for attending the dialogue session. According to him, it has become a tradition to call members of the Institute and the general public to converge virtually from time to time, for a corporate learning and awareness on topical issues that either concern Africa or Africans both here in the continent or in the diaspora. Dr. Udo stated that such issues are determined by the various commissions or the working groups of our Institute. Hence, the continentwide dialogue sessions present opportunity for the Institute members to take a critical look at any matter commissions present with a view to taking policy positions that we believe would be for the best interest of our continent. He stressed





that this was the practical expression of the Institute's motto which is: *Community, Learning and Service.*

The President recalled that the Institute had held several Continental dialogue sessions in the past one year, many of which were convened by the Commission on African Politics, Governance and International Affairs. He commended the commission for living up to the expectations of the Institute, noting that he was happy that the Institute has seasoned academics and professionals who are well versed with international politics and geopolitical dynamics.

The President who described the situation in the Middle East as a political earthquake, viewed the ongoing war from the humanitarian perspective. He said, "when we consider that Africa is the cradle of humankind, I believe that the implication of this scientific fact is that Africans extremely value the dignity of the human person. With regards to this crisis in the Middle East, it would mean that every blood that is spilled whether it is the blood of an Israeli or the blood of a Palestinian, every blood counts." He said, "for this reason I would like to appeal that there should be a cease fire. I am aware that Israel has been provoked by the Hamas initial attack but Isreal should stop killings of civilians and consider a cease fire or a political solution instead of a military earthquake that is going on in Gaza

right now, because for us as Africans every blood that is spilled is a loss for humanity."

Prof. Mutombo Nkulu-NSengha, the Vice Present and Chairman, Board of Directors of the Institute, joined the President to call for a cease fire. For him, Pan-Africanism promotes the idea that all human beings on this planet should have an opportunity to live. He took time to explain the historical and religious backgrounds and dimensions of the war. Similarly, Prof. Mary A. Nyangweso, the Director of Africa Women and Gender Commission of the Institute noted the complicated nature of the Israel-Palestine conflict, stating that it was tied to religion. According to her, "it is unfortunate that many diplomatic solutions to end the war had failed and it doesn't seem to be getting better but worse as the day goes by". She traced the long history between Israel and Africa which dates back to King Solomon, and analyzed the history of Judaism and presence of Jews in Africa. Prof. Nyangweso admonished Africans not to look at the conflict in the area as something far from us, because it is all about our people. According to her it is very unfortunate that women and children are being killed, and may thousands of Palestinians have lost their lives and also that of Israelis; and joined the President to call for a ceasefire.

On his submission, Dr. Peter Kirui, the Deputy Director, Commission on African Politics, Governance and International Affairs of the Institute also noted the complexity of the situation and situated the prolonged conflict between Israel and Palestine on the unhealthy relationship between politics and religion. He explained the UN charter of selfdetermination that led to creation of Israel as an independent state in 1948 with the support of the West. He wondered why the two-state solution to the prolonged conflict was not enough to solve the persistent conflicts between the two groups. From the Pan-African perspective, Dr. Kirui regretted how some African countries leaned to Israel while others backed the Palestinians. When some African countries align with the West who are supporting Israel, it is for political convenience. For him, it was not enough to rely on the United Nations as a tool for mediation. He used the opportunity call for Africa to be represented in the United Nations Security Council.

Meanwhile, Barr. Gabriel Udoh, the Director of the Commission on Law and Human Rights of the Institute noted the manner in which the war further polarized African nations. He said that the tendency to focus on who is right and who is wrong would never bring any peace in conflict situations. "The first thing to discuss in conflict is peace and not fault finding, whether we look at the war from the religious or political perspectives, people always look for someone to put the blame on but this does not lead to achieving peace", he submitted. Barr. Gabriel joined the President to call for a ceasefire.

The Institute members observed that aside from the religious background of the conflict, economic interests with respect to resources as well as strategic political interests of the warring parties and their global allies have contributed to fuel the war. While pursuing these interests, the Institute posits that it is paramount to prioritize human lives and lamented the thousands of human lives already destroyed. The webinar ended with a call for a ceasefire, urging all global citizens of peace not to relent in their efforts in finding political solutions to end the war.


NEW EXECUTIVES INAUGURATED FOR THE COMMISSION ON AFRICAN PEACE AND RECONCILIATION




