#### WHO WE ARE



## ...AFRICAN YOUTHS IN CLIMATE CHANGE

A Webinar Organized by the **TPADI** Commission on African Youth Capacity and Development in collaboration with the Commission on Sustainable Development - Science and Innovation



n the 6th of October, 2023, The Pan-African Dialogue Institute held a continental dialogue on the theme: 'THE ROLE OF AFRICAN YOUTHS IN CLIMATE CHANGE'. The webinar which was hosted by the Commission on African Youth Capacity and Development and the Commission on Sustainable Development-Science and Innovation.

Declaring the webinar open, the President of the Institute, Dr. Effiong Joseph Udo expressed optimism in youth agency in solving Africa's problems, including climate change. He commended the Commissions for coming up with such an apt topic for discussion and prayed that the dialogue session will contribute significantly to address the challenges caused by climate change.

The moderators, Miss Agatha Nyesiga (Director, African Youth Capacity Development Commission) and Mr. Goodnews Akpan (Deputy Director, African Youth Capacity Development Commission) took turns to engage the panelists on issues bordering on the topic.

The Chief Executive Officer of IZON Company and Assistant Head in the Environment and Climate Change Cluster of the Southern Africa Youth Forum, Mr. Isack Nyaimaga noted that climate change are the changes that occur in the climate space. According to him, these changes result in draught,

scarcity of water, environmental degradation, etc. He harped on the need to educate the youths, support youth-led initiatives, provision of funding, recognize and award outstanding youth who have contributed to climate change as

well as encourage youth participation in researches to curb climate change.

While commenting on the role of stakeholders to ensure climate justice, the Deputy Director, Commission on Sustainable Development, Technology and Innovations, Arch. Maliam Ndoko stressed the need to adequately socialize the youths right from home on what they need for their future, create empowerment opportunities for them and as well as encourage youth inclusion in policy drafting and implementation to enable them hone their skills and competencies to address issues of climate change.

Miss Tinotenda Guhu who is the Secretary of the African Youth Capacity Development Commission responding from the youth perspective, highlighted that youths can take active part in addressing climate change by helping to create awareness on the issues associated with climate change, building partnerships and collaborations as well as harnessing their digital skills to protect the environment.


The Director of the Commission on Sustainable Development, Technology and Innovations, Engr. Spiros Lazaris submitted that sustainable infrastructural development like access to essential services, good road infrastructure, access to green energy, conservation of bio-diversity,

environmental sanitation can help to resolve climate injustices and make the environment to safe for human habitation.

Participants in the webinar asked questions on the subject of discourse and made contributions to the subject of discussion and were more enlightened about climate change and the potentials of the youth to manage it.



virtual meeting was held on the 18th day of October, 2023. The meeting was convened by the International President of the Pan-African Dialogue Institute (TPADI) Dr Effiong Udo and was attended by Barr. Dorcas A. James, the Deputy Corporate Secretary of TPADI, Rev. Fr. Dr. Dominic Maximilian Ofori from University of Ghana, Mr. David Bassey Morrow from Nigeria and Luciana Marwa Hanson from Tanzania, respectively.

In his opening remark, the International President of the Institute, Dr Udo welcome all to the meeting and called for a self-introduction by the participants. He also took time to highlight the Institute's profile for the understanding of all the participants; adding that members of the Commission were free to suggest and make inputs where necessary on any area they deemed fit, especially as it concerned the vision, mission and activities of their commission.

## UNIUYO SIGNS MOU TO PROMOTE GLOBAL VISIBILITY

he Vice Chancellor of the University of Uyo . (UNIUYO), Prof. Nyaudoh Ndaeyo, has commended members of The Pan-African Dialogue Institute (TPADI) for their foresight in establishing an international Institute. Prof. Ndaevo said that he was pleased with the choice of UNIUYO to be the host of the Institute, stating the preparedness of the University to support TPADI in its programmes and activities. He charged the Institute to help members of the public acquire knowledge and skills in dialogue in order to promote societal peace and progress. He noted that with recent happenings around the world, particularly, the ongoing Palestinian-Israeli war "there is an urgent need for everyone to fully understand the importance of dialogue to promote peaceful coexistence." The Vice Chancellor Stated this on Thursday October 26, 2023 during the signing ceremony of the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the University and The Pan-African Dialogue Institute.

Earlier, the International President of the Institute, Dr. Effiong Joseph Udo noted that the day was very significant because it will go to the corporate annals of both the University and the Institute. Dr. Udo further hinted that his institute is dedicated to the study and propagation of the values and ideals of Pan-Africanism. According to him, it was the Pan-African movement that made African countries gain their independence from colonizers. He recounted how he had the opportunity to learn more about Pan-Africanism in 2016 at Temple University in Philadelphia, United States of America where he studied under Professor Leonard Swidler and met the co-founder – Professor Mutombo Nkulu-N'Sengha of California State



University, Los Angeles. Dr Udo said his interaction with other African academics, dialogue scholars and practitioners as well as civic society leaders during the one year he was on sabbatical at the Dialogue Institute, Temple University further broadened his horizon. He pointed out that the product of his interaction with African scholars and professionals from different fields of life was their agreement to keep alive the ideals of Pan-Africanism through dialogue by floating a continental/international Institute.

PAN-AFRICANISM, according to Dr. Udo emphasizes the importance of unity, self-determination, dignity, social justice, and African cultural pride. unity of purpose as factors that will aid the process. He said that the revival of this movement was a matter of survival of Africa and preservation of the dignity of Africans all over the world. According to him, within just one year, the membership of the Institute has grown to over 100 scholars and professionals cutting across 19 countries, including Rwanda, Malawi, South Africa, Ethiopia, Nigeria, Democratic Republic of Congo, Zimbabwe, Cameroon, Ghana, Kenya, The Gambia, Namibia, Zambia, Uganda, Tanzania, Sudan, and so on. "Some of our members are also based in the Americas and in Europe, most notably in the United States, the Caribbean, Germany and the United



Kingdom," Dr. Udo said.

He announced that plans are ongoing for an international conference and the launch of the Institute on May 23-26, 2024. This conference which will hold in UNIUYO being the international headquarters of the institute, is planned to coincide with the celebration of International Africa Day 2024 where many international dignitaries are expected to attend.

Meanwhile, at the MOU Signing Ceremony, the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration), Prof. Enoidem Usoro, the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic), Prof. Anthony Udoh, the Registrar, Mrs. Blossom E. Okorie, the University Librarian, Dr. Uduakobong O. Udoh, as well as the Head of Administration in the Vice-Chancellor's Office, Mr. Edet Affia, and the Head of Legal Unit, Barr. Imoh Etukudoh, among others were in attendance to witness the epoch-making event. Officials

who accompanied the President of The Pan-Africanism Dialogue Institute were: Rev. Fr. Dr. Emem Umoren -Chairman Local Organising Committee (LOC), Prof. Emmanuel Akpabio -Director of International Programmes, Barr. Dorcas James - Deputy Corporate Secretary, Mr. Goodnews Akpan -Deputy Director, African Youth Capacity and Development Commission, Mr. David B. Morrow -Deputy Director, Communication, Media and ICT, as well as Dr. Itoro Ikoh - Director of Finance and Mr. Mfon Okon - member Communication, Media and ICT Commission.

The high point of the day was the signing of the MoU officiated by the Head of Legal Unit of the university, Barr. Imoh Etukudoh, and presentation of a plague to the Vice Chancellor by Dr. Udo to mark the beginning of international collaboration between the University and The Pan-African Dialogue Institute.

- When an abstract is accepted, authors will be asked to submit a draft paper. Submitted papers will undergo peer review and feedback provided to the authors.
