Coup In Gabon, Why The Excitement In Africa?

...what happened in Gabon is not a coup, but a probe of democracy' – Peter Kirui

ecently, the Commission on African Politics, Governance and International Relations an arm of The Pan-African Dialogue Institute (TPADI) organized a Continental Dialogue Session with the Theme: 'Coup in Gabon, Why the Excitement in Africa'. The webinar drew participants from different African countries via Zoom who brainstormed on issue bordering on the hitherto paradigm shift from democracy to the forceful take-over of power by the military witnessed in some African countries.

In his opening remarks, the Director, Commission on African Politics, Governance and International Relations, Dr. Jean-Louis Ikambana while welcoming all participants to the conference, also introduced the resource persons to include: Barr. Gabriel Udoh, Director, Commission on Law and Human Right, and Dr Peter Kirui, the Deputy Director, Commission on African Politics, Governance and International Relations. Dr. Ikambana enjoined everyone to participate in the community discussion regarding the Coup in Gabon after presentations by the speakers. According to him, the meaning of democracy is generally understood to be the government of the people by the people and for the people, but in some African countries the military is gaining ground and the people tend to support them. Here, democracy is threatened by the recent development. What do we make out of all of that? After the presentations 'we can hear ideas and recommendations regarding the coup in Cabon', he said. In his presentation, Dr. Peter Kirui, a senior lecturer of History, Government and Conflict at University of Eldoret,

Kenya recounted that he could easily relate the military coup that happened in Zimbabwe to how Emmerson Mnangagwe came into power as the president of Zimbabwe, being a close ally to Robert Mugabe at that time. He stated further that Mnangagwe took power because of the six victimized persons perceived at that time as the Zanu-PF leaders. According to him, he did not find the coup in Zimbabwe that ousted President Mugabe as caused by the provocation in Robert Mugabe's regime, despite the feat he had attained. Dr Kirui stressed that it cannot be proved that the military take-over of power in Cabon was a conventional coup but somewhat as a kind of organization of power prove release. He added that one of the reasons for his position is because Brice Oligui Nguema supposedly swore himself in as the Transitional President and leader of Gabon. He further condemned the former President's tricks and the possibility of working close to the trick of maintaining those particular days which is not the same with the coup committed in West Africa, were there is a sting of doubt.

But in Gabon this was obviously not the case. This was the view of the current President Nguema which may have found basic fact behind the catalyst. Though Nguema may not have actually found the basis to actually condemned the coup.

Dr. Kirui added that politicians are trying to test democracy in Africa but he did not see the coup in Gabon as taking the same root and the same fashion like that of Chad, Mali, Burkina Faso and even Niger. Kirui also stated, 'we are yet to see what happened in Gabon ... I do not see it as a coup, perhaps an attempt to prove the fact that Gabon is going through a simple probe. Thinking positively, it is possible that Ali Bongo may not have won the election. Meaning that it was recorded and completed in Gabon, hence if he was allowed to continue in power, that the election conducted by him was not attainable'.


